ince September 2016 the school has been making plans to create raised beds for planting around the Sixth Form and Secondary School perimeter. The intention is to create a growing scheme project that students can participate in.

Chris Rothon (Sixth Form Registrar) and I made several visits to local schools in the borough that currently run garden projects. This included a visit to Chisenhale Primary

School, a school which has really made the most of the space they have. They produce their own honey, and grow enough salad throughout the summer months to supply most of their school's needs. It was a great eye opener into how to utilise small areas around buildings.

I was advised to get in touch with the Capital Growth Scheme who supply free help and information in getting projects like these up and running. Through joining the

Capital Growth Scheme we received a lot of help with sourcing companies for funding the project and for receiving great resources.

After several meetings with Crossrail, their contractors Skanska/C360 kindly agreed to supply and build four raised beds for us, all free of charge, sited at the Sixth Form front entrance. These are now complete and are ready to be planted.

We have all the materials in place for further raised beds, which will

be situated behind the football caged area in the upper school playground, and aim to build these soon.

It has been a fantastic opportunity to kick-start a project like this, which we anticipate will be a benefit for everyone.

Scheme Join us!

Do you know your blackberries from your blueberries? Or a courgette from a cucumber? If you would like to learn how to grow fruits, vegetables, herbs and spices, we have an exciting new project which just might tickle your taste buds!



What is the SJCR Growing Scheme? We are starting our very own growing scheme within the school grounds, utilising the many available spaces to install raised beds

and allotments, perfect for growing a variety of fruits, vegetables and plants. Students from years 7-13 will all work together to create and maintain beautiful green spaces, which can be admired and enjoyed by us all. You may have already noticed the large raised beds outside the Sixth Form building on Bromley Street, just waiting for the seeds to be planted. With five more raised beds being installed around the upper playground over the next few weeks, there is plenty of opportunity for everyone to get involved. It's not simply a case of 'watering the flowers'... it's understanding where our food comes from, how it grows, physical and mental well-being, confidence, teamwork, communication, learning about the environment and sustainability – the benefits are endless!

Competitions and Awards

To begin with each 'green team' will be allocated an area which they will be responsible for, with termly competitions and

awards being held in recognition of their efforts. We will provide training to ensure that everyone is adequately equipped in terms of knowledge, expectations and health and safety. Ultimately, the goal is for the gardens and allotments to be maintained entirely by the students (albeit with a little supervision from our green fingered staff members!)

We have already joined the Capital Growth Scheme, London's largest food growing network, who offer support with growing food in London. We have also joined the Royal Horticultural Society's Campaign for School Gardening and already achieved Level 1 status. We hope to achieve Level 5 within the next 12-18 months. There will also be regular updates on our school social media pages, newsletter and local press.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE

(CZECH REPUBLIC - ITALY - UNITED KINGDOM)

few weeks ago, an international exchange took place at Sir John Cass Red Coat School. It lasted for five days and involved students and teachers from Czech Republic and Italy. Since the beginning of the school year many SJCR students involved in the International Club have been working very hard preparing for this visit as well as doing activities in collaboration with the other European students.

During this meeting, both SJCR and European students participated in several

activities in and outside of the school. They took several lessons especially prepared for them about e-safety, radicalism, religious faiths in Tower Hamlets, English traditional sports and the Bangladeshi influence in London. They also participated in trips outside of the school including a visit to the Ragged School Museum, the London Museum and walking tours around the East End and City of London.

Finally the foreign teachers worked with the MFL department and observed some

lessons in different languages. Constructive feedback was delivered and some very useful ideas were shared in terms of different education systems and styles.

This exchange has been fully covered by the European Union funding as a part of two years Eramus+ project. In addition to this visit, in the near future SJCR students will have the great opportunity to visit their partner students in Castel Ritaldi (Italy) and Prerov (Czech Republic).













SIR JOHN CASS **CONNECTED TO**

SPAIN, FRANCE AND BANGLADESH

he MFL department have been running several activities in order to connect SJCR students with the countries, language and culture of our three main taught languages; French, Spanish and Bengali.

Some students partake in a pen-pal activity with I.E.S. Rafael Alberti, a secondary school in Cádiz (Spain) and with College La Perriere, a primary school in Lyon (France). Every two months, SJCR students studying either

Spanish or French receive and write a hand written letter according to the topic that they are learning at the time. Each student always sends and receives a letter to the same student so that the pen-pal communication is really effective.

In addition, students currently studying Bengali have had a video conference with a Kaligonj KUP Public Pilot High School, a secondary school in Lalmonirhat (Bangladesh). Approximately every three

months, a specific time is agreed, taking into account the time difference and having students of a similar age so that they can speak together. In this way, students from both schools can practice their second language (English or Bengali) with native speakers. These conferences are prepared with guidelines in advance to ensure that the conversation follows topics currently being studied.

n 21st February 2017 our Business class went to Mile End to do our live marketing campaign for the Basement Coffee Lounge. The purpose of the marketing campaign was to attract potential customers and let them know about the coffee lounge, whilst allowing us students to get first-hand experience as to how marketing works for a business.

We designed flyers with promotional offers, posters and leaflets for the campaign to hand out to members of the public to make them aware of the coffee business nearby, and tell these potential customers what was on offer. To really get the customers attracted to the business, we gave free samples such as cakes and

hot drinks so the customers knew what to expect when they came in to the shop to order.

We divided into teams, which included a sampling team, a sales team, a research team and an advertising team. Each group had to hand out flyers and approach customers and draw their attention to the business using the AIDA model for marketing. It was a massive success for The Basement Coffee Lounge. We handed out 2,500 flyers/leaflets and business cards, and through our promotion, The Basement Coffee Lounge made over £60 worth of sales, making it the most successful day for the business to date. In the following weeks from our marketing

campaign, many people visited The Basement Coffee Lounge and followed the business on social media.

Overall the live campaign was a great experience for us as students and customers. We would like to thank Mr Shahid for giving us the opportunity and for helping us to develop the marketing skills we had learnt in class and for organising this successful trip.

Barts Healthcare NHS Trust kicked off their Healthcare Science Week with an open day event at the Royal London Hospital to educate students about the support roles within hospitals and to show them that a career into medicine did not only mean going through the medicine degree route.

After a brief introduction by the team from Barts NHS the attendees, which included a large cohort from SJCR's year 11, 12 and 13 pupils, were spilt into two groups. One group headed straight to the rooms where various departments including Neurophysiology, Audiology, Cardiology, Electroencephalogram and Radiotherapy. Staff in these departments explained their roles in the NHS and demonstrated the various machines.

Students were able to try out the equipment and ask staff any questions that they had. Had it not been for the event, students may never have had the opportunity to do so. Staff were very engaging and had the full attention of the students. After spending time in one room they were moved along to investigate the other departments that support the nurses and doctors to help with the care delivered to patients by the NHS.

Meanwhile, the second group headed to the lecture theatre where they were treated to a talk by one of the senior support staff who shared information about her route into the profession. She spoke to the students about how she had failed her A-Levels, but had still managed to get into medicine via an alternative route. Others spoke of how students can do access courses or apprenticeships. In April the Royal London Hospital kicked off their apprenticeship scheme, details of which can be found on the Careers notice board in the 6th form reception. The overall message of the day from staff and exhibitors

was that a career in medicine does not mean university anymore, as there are many schemes available to kick start your career into the world of care.



orld Book Day (WBD) this year was a very busy day. It started with an assembly provided by members of the Years 7 and 8 Reading Clubs, explaining the purpose of WBD and describing the work of the two charities that the school supports; Book Aid and Readathon.

This year some staff dressed up as their favourite book characters and students had to try and guess who they were, the winner of the competition was Talha Saif, 11E. There was also a competition where students had to guess who the teacher was hiding behind one of their favourite books and the winner was Summer Robinson in 11C.

For the first time students in Key Stage 3 could also dress up. As a form, they had to decide their favourite book and dress up as the characters from this book. The joint winning forms were 7S who dressed as characters from Oliver Twist and 8S who dressed as characters from Alice in Wonderland.

For approximately 2 weeks prior to WBD students had been asking people to sponsor them for the Readathon where students had to read for 1 hour.

Tower Hamlets School Library Service had also arranged a very special event for WBD this year. Author Jacqueline Wilson came to York Hall to speak to the students of Tower Hamlets. We were able to take a group of 28 students to hear Jacqueline describe her childhood, talk about her career as a writer, explain where she gets her ideas for her books and also to tell us about the details of her new books. She also signed some of her books which can be found in the school library.

Altogether the school raised a fantastic £258.08 for the Readathon Charity, and £157.54 for World Book Day.











Shakespeare 400

2016 marked the 400th anniversary of playwright William Shakespeare's death. To help celebrate the legacy of his incredible body of work, which continues to influence us today, Into Film delivered a Shakespeare 400 filmmaking programme. They commissioned eight BFI Film Audience Network (FAN) organisations across the UK to work with local filmmakers in order to help young people aged 13-17 create their own films inspired by one of Shakespeare's plays. This included a group of students from Sir John Cass Red Coat School.

For inspiration, the young people attended screenings of films inspired by Shakespeare's works, which helped

support their idea development, before then taking part in a five day programme of filmmaking activity, ultimately creating their own short films. Our students filmed an adaptation based on Shakespeare's play, Richard III. The filmmakers then celebrated their achievements by watching their completed films at showcase events, attended by friends and family.

E-safety guidance for parents

Using YouTube Advice for Parents Article from Mr. Jones Online Safety Officer

YouTube is a big part of online life for many children and young people, from watching games to funny videos, and even the strange phenomenon of unboxing videos.

I use YouTube a lot for various things such as DIY tasks, to get advice and opinion on certain professional topics, and to view various tutorials.

There are so many positives to using YouTube, but as with anything there are negatives too; out of the hundreds of millions of videos that are on the platform there is a completely unknown number of videos that are wholly inappropriate, regardless of age.

- Talk to your children about the channels they watch and assure yourself that these are appropriate.
- Does your child have his/her own channel? Some children I speak to have their own, and also say their parents aren't aware. Check, and see what they're uploading.

- Apply the Restricted Mode settings. Restricted Mode is an optional setting that you can use to help screen out potentially inappropriate content that you may prefer not to see or don't want others in your family to see. You will need to have a YouTube account to do this. Do it with your child so that you can explain why you're doing it. Equally, let them know that if they see something concerning they can talk to you about it.
- For younger children, consider using the YouTube Kids app on handheld devices.
- Learn how to report (flag) inappropriate videos.
